

## CITY MANAGER'S WEEKLY UPDATE

November 9, 2012

### **CENTRAL GALT INTERCHANGE**

Final work is underway to energize the streetlights throughout the interchange and erect the final overhead signage. This will allow opening up the C Street bridge portion of the interchange with temporary stop signs during the coming week. Upon arrival of the signal controllers, the signals will be fully energized allowing full opening of all the ramps and normal traffic patterns on the interchange. This final work should be completed by the end of the month.

### **GRANT UPDATES - POLICE**

Police staff attended an OTS Distracted Driving grant meeting in Gold River. The City was awarded \$7,200, with the distracted driver (cell phones, texting, etc) campaign beginning at the end of November. Staff is also researching the availability of additional grant funding. Homeland Security may have residual funds available that may help with the federally mandated P25 compliant radio system.

### **OVERSIGHT BOARD MEETING**

At its November 8<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Redevelopment Successor Agency Oversight Board approved the Due Diligence Review for the Redevelopment Agency housing funds.

### **PLANNING COMMISSION MEETING**

At its November 8<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Planning Commission approved the Vesting Tentative Map for the Fairway Oaks project, which is located between Lincoln Way and SR 99 at the southern end of the City. The development will include 100 single family homes.

### **SCT/LINK MANAGEMENT IMPROVEMENT STUDY**

Sacramento Area Council of Governments has contracted with Moore and Associates to conduct a SCT/Link Transit Management Improvement Plan study for Galt. The purpose of the study is to analyze the current management structure and identify potential alternatives for improvement and reduced administrative costs. Additionally, the study will analyze and detail the benefits, requirements and possible site locations and costs for a dedicated maintenance/operations facility for SCT/Link. Interviews with staff and elected officials have recently begun.
